





Ye Olde Eules Holiday on December 9





Road construction making headway in north Euless

The construction project to widen Mid-Cities Blvd. to six lanes and move a portion of the roadway out of a floodplain began in June and is progressing better on the east than on the west end of the thoroughfare.


As of early September the prime contractor, Orval Hall Excavation, had begun excavation operations on the eastbound lanes of Mid-Cities from Main St. to Fuller-Wiser. A portion of the Mid-Cities median had been removed and temporarily paved with asphalt to provide a construction detour location. The new additional roadway lanes had been constructed from SH 360 to Bear Creek Parkway.

The contractor had also cleared the right-of-way from FM 157 to Main St. with the exception of the Little Bear Creek area. Because this is a Texas Department of Transportation (TxDOT) roadway improvement project, TxDOT is awaiting final clearance from the U. S. Army Corps of Engineers for the bridge and channel work at the creek (just east of Bob Eden Park).


While waiting for the final clearance, the contractor began installing box culverts and storm drains on the portion of Mid-Cities west of Main St.

Although the contractor had anticipated that the project would be completed in 15 months, TxDOT's delay in dealing with the Corps of Engineers may extend the construction schedule into the fall of 2001.

Through the winter, expect bridge construction over Little Bear Creek and continued roadway excavation and paving operations. If you would like more information, contact the Engineering Department at (817) 685-1694.

From North Main St. to SH 360, Harwood Road is currently a two-lane asphalt roadway. In just a few short months, however, it will be transformed into a concrete, six-lane divided roadway.

According to the construction sequence on this City of Euless roadway widening project, the eastbound lanes will be constructed first.

As of early September the contractor, Jackson Construction had installed storm drainage facilities and some sanitary sewer work was completed along the westbound lanes of Harwood Rd. in the vicinity of Harwood Townhomes.

The eastbound lanes have been excavated and subgrade stabilization began in late August. Upon completion of the subgrade stabilization, the new concrete pavement will be installed.

The contractor is currently on schedule to complete the project in the early spring of 2001.

City Council votes to maintain current tax rate

Thanks to the hard work and dedication of staff and Euless' elected officials, City Council has approved a \$19.3 million dollar budget for Fiscal 2001, an increase of \$800,000 over the previous year. In addition, Council voted to maintain the current property tax rate at 51.5¢. Citing income received from a car-rental tax approved by voters in November, Council members declined to approve a suggested 1.5¢ increase per \$100 valuation. However, your taxes will probably rise a few dollars due to an increase in property values. Last year, the average value of a home was \$88,606. In 2000, the average home value increased to \$93,416. See the Tax Rate Impact chart to the right for exact dollar amounts (*Table 1*).

"We are very grateful we were able to hold the line on the tax rate this year," said Mayor Mary Lib Saleh (*Table 2*). "We listened to our residents, looked at the budget, were able to move some things around and came up with a workable solution."

"We are pleased that we can continue to provide outstanding services at a very competitive tax rate," Mayor Saleh added (*Table 3*).






As our population grows (Table 4), so does our tax base. And so does the number of improvement projects necessary to maintain a strong infrastructure.

According to Expenditures Per Capita (Table 5), Euless has been able to keep expenditures down while budgeting for necessary repairs and improvements.

Although Euless' taxable valuation is slightly lower than other nearby cities (Table 6), thanks to the Half Cent Sales Tax, the Car Rental Tax, the Crime Control District Sales Tax and the Property Relief Sales Tax, Euless has been very successful in maintaining a fiscally-sound budget, providing essential services and offering many quality-of-life improvements.

Highlights of the FY 2001 Budget

The budget includes an average 8 percent pay increase for firefighters and police officers. Other staff members will receive an average 5.5 percent pay increase.

Other highlights include:

- maintain current level of services
- \$70,000 for additional library materials
- \$300,000 for street overlay
- \$100,000 for sidewalks
- \$110,000 for irrigation of parks
- \$23,025 for fire safety training trailer
- \$1.2 million for new park maintenance building from Car Rental Tax
- \$60,000 for three thermal imagers for the Fire Department


City services are supported by your tax dollars

Based on an average home value of \$93,416, each household will pay \$384.69* in city taxes for the year, or \$32.06 per month, to support these city services:

- 24 hour Police protection
- 24 hour Fire protection
- 24 hour Ambulance service
- Maintenance of all public streets and street lighting
- Library facility and services
- Park facilities including softball fields and walking trails
- Recreational facilities including a gym and walking track
- Animal Control services
- Environmental Health services including restaurant inspections

Planning & Development Department strives to enhance our community

Planning and Development are two ominous sounding words, inspiring visions of blueprints, maps and a vocabulary resembling Greek. In hopes of dispelling these and other notions, Eric Wilhite, Planning and Development Manager, explains the City of Euless function of Planning and Development.

The Planning and Development Department functions as a multi-disciplinary partner in maintaining, enhancing and developing our community. "Anyone who has been to a Planning & Zoning Commission or City Council meeting, conducted a garage sale or special event or received a building permit for remodeling or new construction has been exposed to our department," said Wilhite.

Although most citizens are not familiar with this department, it participates in every phase of the development cycle beginning with initial master planning, development and construction permits, through inspections and long-term property maintenance. To accomplish this, the department is divided into three interrelated divisions.

Planning is primarily responsible for direction and coordination of all planning, zoning and property development activities. The team members meet with prospective developers to explain City codes and to review proposed projects. Staff also relays information to the public over the counter and over the phone, reviews site plan applications and any zoning or planning issues

to ensure zoning codes are complied with. The staff works closely with the Planning and Zoning Commission and the City Council in the approval of requests.

Code Services includes systematic property code inspections, environmental health and housing code enforcement. These team members strive to gain voluntary compliance as the initial step toward correcting any problems. Code Services officers are authorized to issue citations for violations of city ordinances whenever such action is necessary to gain compliance. These dedicated individuals perform a valuable service in assisting to maintain a safe and beautiful community.

Building Inspection reviews architectural plans, issues building permits and monitors construction activities.

"Having three groups with talented, hard working people working together in one department creates an atmosphere that is conducive in coordinating efforts to complete tasks in a timely and efficient manner, he said.

"The Planning and Development Department's goal in everything we do is to help make Euless a safe, attractive and liveable community for everyone."


Each year Euless produces the largest holiday parade in Northeast Tarrant County.

National Night Out highlighted neighborliness and safety

They came from the air-conditioned comfort of their homes, brought out their lawn furniture, drank cold sodas and got to know their neighbors.

Throughout Euless, 35 neighborhood parties took place on Tuesday, August 1 as part of National Night Out, a program launched to promote police-community partnerships.

Beginning at 6 p.m., police, firefighters and paramedics took to the streets, trying to make an appearance at each and every National Night Out event. They shook lots of hands, answered lots of questions and even ate a hot dog or two, all in the name of community involvement.

"It wasn't an easy job," said Chief of Police Leonard Carmack, who tried to visit 11 groups in a just a few hours. "But I did my best to sample a little of the treats being served at each stop. By the end of the night, my uniform was fitting much tighter than in the beginning."

Sgt. Ron Williamson also spent the evening trying to reach as many groups as possible. He said that National Night Out is a time for neighborhoods to get together and get to know each other. "By knowing who lives in your neighborhood and a little about them, [it] makes it easier to know when something is wrong."

Another benefit of meeting local fire fighters and police officers is that "when concerns are identified, whether it be streets, parks, fire or police, this information is passed on to the proper department so they can be addressed," said Sgt. Williamson.

Organized by the National Association of Town Watch, National Night Out is designed to: 1. heighten crime and drug prevention awareness; 2. generate support for, and participation in, local anti-crime programs; 3. strengthen neighborhood spirit and police-community partnerships; and 4. send a message to criminals letting them know that neighborhoods are organized and fighting back.




