



## A Eules treasure

**Willie Mae McCormick, 93, named 2001 Volunteer of the Year**

**W**illie Mae McCormick began her love affair with Eules when she married Mac McCormick, a large land owner in the northern part of Eules. She became involved in her community and when she retired as the first female engineer at Vought Aeronautics, she was elected the first female council person in Eules. Her service on the Eules City Council began as council member from 1973 to 1975 and as mayor pro tem from 1975 to 1985.

She has also served many years, often concurrently, on boards and commissions including: Charter Review Committee, Civil Service Commission, Eules Non-Profit Industrial Development Authority, Historical Preservation Committee, Library Board, North Central Texas Council of Governments, Texas State Library Board, Hurst-Eules-Bedford Chamber of Commerce Board of Directors and the Trinity River Authority.

At 93 years of age, Willie Mae McCormick is still serving the City of Eules.

My daughter and I have a nightly ritual of sharing our "favorite thing" of our day. On the day I interviewed Ms. McCormick for the Volunteer of the Year award, I told my daughter my favorite thing was meeting "the most wonderful lady today!"

She shared with me her childhood memories of growing up in Centerville, Texas. At the turn of the 20th century, it was a small town with no electricity, no running water, no cars, no computers, no ice, no air conditioning, no buses, no bicycles, no trains, no planes, few books and magazines, no newspapers and un-reliable phone service.

According to McCormick, her father had a sixth grade education and her mother had even less. She attended a two-room school house through the 11th grade, then had to go to another "accredited" school for 12th grade. She was the first person in her community to complete her high school education.

"I always knew I would go to college," she said. "I didn't know how, but I knew I was going to go."

She was accepted to the Baylor Female College for Women in Waco. They gave her a job to pay for her room and board. For the first three months she was there, she washed dishes for 15¢ an hour. She worked in the chemistry lab for the rest of college and earned 30¢ an hour.

She met her husband, Mac, her first year at Baylor. For McCormick, May 29, 1929 was a "red letter day" — she received her bachelor's degree, got married and saw her first talking picture show on the same day.

In 1931, she earned her MS from Hardin-Simmons.

While living in Big Spring, McCormick taught school during the day and worked for the Weather Bureau in the evening.

When World World II took her husband to India, McCormick took a job at Dow Chemical in Freeport. "It's the only time I really used my chemistry degree," she said.

From there, she went to work for Vought Aeronautics as a scientific programmer. She was responsible for doing vibration studies on aircrafts and ran the calculations on aircrafts taking off from aircraft carriers. She recalled that once she got a raise but not a promotion. The reasoning? "That's a good salary for a woman," her supervisor told her.

It took her 10 or 12 years to earn her engineer rating.

Following her retirement in 1973, she became involved in civic affairs. And the rest, as they say, is history. She has left an indelible mark on Eules and her continued support has guaranteed her legacy for many, many years.

As I was wrapping up the interview, I asked Ms. McCormick what advice would she like for me to share.

"If you don't have the commitment to accomplish something, you won't have tenacity. There will always be things that come along to deter you, but if you want it bad enough, you can get it."

Thank you, Ms. McCormick, for my "favorite thing" that beautiful spring day.

## Citizen Fire and Police academies promote behind-the-scenes education

**U**p close and personal. This is the phrase used to describe Euless' Citizen's Fire Academy. "It's been a desire of the Fire Department for several years," says Fire Inspector Christine Cox. They have wanted to give residents the opportunity to be "up close and personal" to what fire fighters and paramedics do on the job every day.

One of the most demanding aspects of the class is the "controlled burn" situation. Fully suited in protective clothing, class members are taken into a situation "where they have a better understanding of fire conditions and the physical demands fire fighters must overcome," says Cox.

**C**omprehensive in scope, the Citizens Police Academy presents a look at the internal operations, values and philosophy of the Euless Police Department.

The academy is a 36-hour block of instruction designed to give the public a working knowledge of the "hows and whys" of the department and the citizens' role in their interaction with the police. It consists of a series of classes, held once each week for three hours.

The instruction is comprehensive, covering a different area of the Police Department each week.

Created to provide enough information to the citizens who attend so they may be more familiar with the operations and activities of the Police Department. Students then share

this realistic view of the department with other citizens to improve the efficiency of law enforcement in their neighborhoods.

The department, in turn, becomes more aware of the feelings and concerns of the community from the participant's interaction




## Give neighborhood crime a “going away party” Eules joins cities nationwide in National Night Out on August 6

**O**n Tuesday, August 6, neighborhoods throughout Eules are being invited to join forces with thousands of communities nationwide for the “19th Annual National Night Out” crime and drug prevention event.

Last year, police attended 26 events in Eules. According to Neighborhood Patrol Officer Tony Burnett, “National Night Out is the perfect opportunity for you to meet your neighbors and kick off a new crime watch group.”

From 6 to 10 p.m. on August 6, residents in neighborhoods throughout Eules, and across the nation, are asked to lock their doors, turn on outside lights and spend the evening outside with neighbors and police. Many neighborhoods throughout Eules will be hosting a variety of special events such as block parties, cookouts, parades, visits from police, flashlight walks, contests, youth activities and anti-crime rallies.

“This is a night for America to stand together to promote awareness, safety and neighborhood unity. National Night Out showcases the vital importance of police-community partnerships and citizen involvement in our fight to build a safer nation. On August 6, we invite neighborhoods nationwide to join us in ‘Giving Crime & Drugs A Going Away Party.’”



National Night Out, which is sponsored by the National Association of Town Watch and co-sponsored locally by the Eules Police Department, will involve more than 9,700 communities from all 50 states, U.S. territories, Canadian cities and military bases around the world. In all, more than 33 million people are expected to participate in “America's Night Out Against Crime” on August 6.

## Setting new limits on speed

### Council adopts new speed limits on three roadways

**B**e sure to check your speedometer. At the May 14 City Council meeting, Council adopted new speed limits on two new roadways and amended the speed limit on Mid-Cities Blvd.

Three new subdivisions within the City of Euless have added arterial thoroughfares to the City's street system. Harrington Gardens Parkway was created as part of the Heritage Towne Crossing addition where the new SuperTarget is located at Glade Rd. and SH 121.

Gateway Blvd. was constructed with the Centurion and Lakes of Little Bear additions, just north of Mid-Cities and east of Industrial Blvd.


Since both of these arterial roadways are new and currently have no through traffic, a speed limit of 30 MPH was adopted. As traffic increases on these roadways and speed histories are

established, speed studies may be performed to determine if the speed limit should be increased.

Since Mid-Cities Blvd. was widened, TxDOT conducted speed studies and posted a new speed limit of 40 MPH from Industrial Blvd. to West Airfield Dr. Council adopted the new speed limit in order to bring the Euless Code of Ordinances in line with the speed limit recommended and posted by TxDOT.

Before the widening project, a speed limit of 35 MPH was posted on Mid-Cities between Industrial Blvd. and N. Main St. and between Fuller-Wiser and West Airfield Dr., while the section between N. Main St. and Fuller-Wiser was shown as 30 MPH.

According to City Engineer Ron Young, the new speed limit on Mid-Cities is consistent with its improved surface and design.



## In a state of construction

### Three Euless roadways affected by construction

**I**t seems like it's been forever, but Harwood Rd. is inching closer to completion every day, with the end of July being the latest date supplied by the contractor.

Once Harwood Rd. is finished, the City will begin Phase I of the Main Street redevelopment project. From Midway Dr. north to Harwood, Main Street will undergo an incredible transition. The roadway will be widened to include landscaped medians and protected left turn lanes. Where the 15 homes were demolished on the west side of Main, a greenscape with a lighted meandering path will be installed. A masonry wall will be built on the east side of the remaining properties as a street noise barrier.

Phase II of the Main Street redevelopment, from Hwy. 10 north to Midway Dr., will begin upon completion of Phase I.

Further south, near the Texas Star Golf Course, the portion of S. Pipeline between Royal Parkway and Texas Star Parkway is closed. According to the Texas Department of Transportation, heavy rains earlier in the spring caused the damage pictured to the right.

Although the City of Euless has applied for federal funding to replace the bridge, the project will not be completed until the summer of 2004. The bridge will remain closed until it can be replaced.

## Looking forward to some free time Fire Marshal retires after 32 years of service to others

**H**olding both Master Firefighter and Master Police Officer certificates, Assistant Chief/Fire Marshal Michael Logan has spent the last 32 years dedicating his life to the service of others.

Beginning his career with the Richland Hills Police Department in 1970 as a Communications Officer, he transferred into the Fire Department just a few months later in order to take advantage of the shift work schedule that would allow him to continue his education. Although Police work was his first choice of a career, he soon fell in love with the Fire Service. In October 1973, he joined the Eulesse Fire Department.

With a devotion to both Fire and Police, Michael was commissioned as a Peace Officer, Arson Investigator in June 1976; then in 1979 he was appointed as Assistant Chief/Fire Marshal of the Eulesse Fire Department.

"The fire service has changed a lot since the early '70s. It was all manual, now it is all wire and technology," Logan says. "A lot has changed. Arson laws have changed, for the better. Adult arson is down because of these laws and new technology. These new laws help to gain convictions and cause future perpetrators to rethink their actions."

Education is an important component in Logan's life. Holding an Associate's Degree in Fire Protection Technology and an Associate's Degree

in Criminal Justice, both from Tarrant County Junior College, he has continued his education with more than 3000 classroom hours in continuing education courses.


"Education is key. You have to have an education; you can't just stop learning." Logan is proud to have spent his career with a city that supports this way of thinking. "This city is great about sending its employees to classes and seminars," Logan boasts.

In his early days, he joined the U.S. Air Force to complete his military obligation during the Vietnam War era. He received an honorable discharge in 1970 from Carswell Air Force Base in Fort Worth. Although he was from Arizona, and his family was still there, Logan chose to stay in Texas to be with a certain young lady who stole his heart.

After 34 years, he and his wife, Vicki, plan to spend much of their free time with their two children, Eric and Lisa. Eric and his wife, Heather, have a three-year-old daughter named Erica who absolutely lights up each time she comes up to visit her "grandpa."

Assistant Chief/Fire Marshal Michael Logan has truly made a lasting impression with the Eulesse Fire Department. The many improvements he has been a part of and organized will forever be a testament to his devotion to the fire service. His many years of service will truly be remembered with fondness and appreciation.

## Gone fishin'...

### Eules' Fire Education Officer retires after 28 years

**A**fter twenty-eight years and eight months, Lt. Franchot Thomas made the decision to retire on May 31, 2002. He and his wife Ann have built a lake house in Frankston, Texas and plan to spend their time fishing out on the lake and spoiling their 3 grandsons rotten!

Lt. Thomas has done many things throughout his employment time to help promote the safety of the citizens of Eules.

Once a year throughout the United States a program called "Fire Prevention Week" is held during the month of October at your local schools. From Pre-K through the 6th grade, each age group learns a different valuable life-saving skill. Each year Lt. Thomas spends countless hours organizing and updating teachers for the week as well as gathering supplies that will be needed.

Thanks to Lt. Thomas, several years of our Fire Department's history have been captured on film. Whenever there has been an accident, training exercise, or special event, Lt. Thomas, along with his trusty camera, was there to capture the action! Many of these photos have been used for slide presentations that are put to music and enjoyed at our Annual Fire Fighters Awards Banquet and Citizen's Fire Academy banquets. Long days are filled with matching the right photo with appropriate music, with an end result that is truly entertaining and often thought provoking.

Each April, Lt. Thomas and his wife Ann dedicate themselves to a weekend full of Arbor Daze. From morning to night, this upbeat couple stands under a tent and greets anyone interested in learning about the Citizen's Fire Academy or the fire service. They hand out fire toys to children and, while letting them

explore the inside of a fire truck, Lt. Thomas takes a Polaroid photo and hands their picture to a parent.

The Juvenile Fire Setters Program is another program that Lt. Thomas usually does after his normal hours of operation. When a child has been caught playing with matches or setting fires, they have an option. They can be held responsible for their actions with the legal system, or they can voluntarily enter the Fire Department's Juvenile Fire Setters Program. This program allows the child and at least one parent to attend a weekly learning class on the dangers of playing with fire.

The most recent project organized by Lt. Thomas was the Elementary Incentive Program. This honors a child who shows an improvement in some area, whether it is a safety issue or an improvement on their grades. Once every six weeks, teachers vote on their students and the winner is picked up from home in a Eules Fire truck and taken to school. Once at school, their entire class is waiting for them outside to cheer them on. What an honor and confidence boost to these children who have worked hard to make a conscious effort of improvement!

These are only a few of the high points of his job. Lt. Franchot Thomas has spent the last 16 years teaching the citizens of Eules, young and old alike, the importance of Fire & Safety Prevention.

Filling his shoes will not be an easy task! We are truly going to miss him!



### In the Spring edition of Eules Today, city staff announced the implementation of a new emergency advisory radio system.

Due to circumstances beyond our control, the radio system did not perform to our expectations and has been returned to the manufacturer. Eules' Emergency Management office recommends the purchase of a weather alert radio for your home in the case of a weather emergency.

The outdoor warning siren system is fully operational. The city also has the capability to override cable programming in the case of an emergency. This feature will be seen only by cable subscribers.

**Watch your school zones this fall**  
**City Council revises school zone times and locations**

**B**e aware of changes in school zones this fall! The School Zone ordinance amendments adopted on June 25, 2002, change the effective time for schools. The school zones that were previously 7:30–8:30 a.m. and 2–4 p.m. are now 7:30 a.m.–4p.m unless the school speed zone is controlled by a flashing sign.

The City of Euless is in the process of installing additional flashing school speed zone signs on the major roadways in Euless. This will allow the City the flexibility of operating school zones on major roadways at the times when reduced speeds are actually needed.


The effect of the ordinance revision is to create “all day” school zones on residential streets adjacent to schools while the major roadways adjacent to schools will have school zones in effect only during arrival and dismissal times.

The ordinance change also created additional school speed zones for Lakewood Elementary and North Euless Elementary schools.

**School Speed Zone Revisions**

Residential streets adjacent to schools will have “all day” school zones from 7:30 a.m. to 4 p.m.

Major roadways adjacent to schools will have school zones in effect “when lights are flashing.”





## City Council members volunteer time and energy to make Eules great

Imagine having a job where you don't receive paid time off, sick leave, medical benefits or even a paycheck. Imagine listening and responding to your neighbors' concerns and complaints every day.
