

Mother crashes SUV, injuring eight teenagers

EULESS — A Eulesss mother police suspect of driving drunk crashed her sport utility vehicle Saturday night, injuring eight teenagers, including her daughter, who were riding with her, police said Monday.

The 37-year-old mother and the two boys and six girls were transported to hospitals in Irving and Grapevine, but there were no life-threatening injuries, police said.

Police are awaiting a blood-alcohol test on the mother before proceeding with the case, Eulesss police Lt. John Williams said Monday.

The woman faces multiple charges of driving while intoxicated, police said. No one has been arrested, police said.

The accident happened shortly before 10:30 p.m. Saturday in the 1200 block of Donley Court. The Eulesss woman had picked up the teenagers following a movie, police said. She was driving a 2002 Chevrolet TrailBlazer southbound on Donley Court when she swerved to miss a dog, she told police. According to witnesses interviewed by police, the driver swerved to avoid a parked vehicle.

The TrailBlazer hit a curb, breaking a wheel and causing the SUV to flip over, police said.

Three of the teens are 14 years old and five teens are 15 years old, police said Monday.

7-year-old boy OK after being shot in road rage incident

EULESS — When the teens drove up alongside his vehicle on Milam Drive on Thursday afternoon, a Euless father saw a pistol and heard a gunshot.

Within seconds, the father heard his 7-year-old son crying and realized that the gunman had fired at them.

"I just thought they fired into the air," the father said Friday in Spanish. Fearing retaliation, he asked that his name not be used. "I thought they just wanted to scare me."

The boy escaped serious injury when he was hit by a bullet that had passed through a door, police said Friday.

The bullet did not penetrate the boy's skin, police said.


The shooting occurred shortly after 3:30 p.m. in the 400 block of Milam Drive.

The father said he had picked his children up from school and was driving home when two men drove up behind him in an older-model brown Cadillac.

The man told police that the driver of the Cadillac became upset because he did not move out of the way fast enough.

The driver blew his horn twice, the father said Friday morning.

"They pulled up beside me and said, 'What's up?' and then I saw the pistol," he said.

"I heard the gunshot."

The Cadillac drove on but almost immediately, the father said, he heard his son crying.

The man drove to his home, where he tended to his son and called 911.

"It was like a hard blow to him, but he was fine," the father said. Authorities later found the bullet in his vehicle.

After the shooting, the Cadillac sped away north on Milam Drive, police said.

The only description police released was that the assailants were Hispanic teenagers.

2 small earthquakes felt in Metroplex

The Dallas-Fort Worth area experienced something rare, yet moving overnight Thursday — two small earthquakes that could be felt in the heart of the Metroplex.

The two small jolts hit southwest Irving at 11:25 p.m. Thursday and at 12:01 a.m. Friday, according to the U.S. Geological Survey's Information Center in Golden, Colo.

The first was a 2.5 magnitude quake and the second was a 3.0 magnitude, the center reported.

It awakened residents in Fort Worth, Irving, Euless and Grand Prairie, survey geophysicist Randy Baldwin said Friday.

Had the quakes occurred

just before noon instead of the middle of the night, the 3.0 magnitude quake probably would have gone unnoticed, Baldwin said. "There were people within three miles of where it hit and they didn't feel a thing," Baldwin said. "Last night's earthquake was noticed by so many people because it hit during the quiet part of the day." No damage was reported.

"It lasted a few seconds," Baldwin said. "It probably felt like a truck passing by."

The last earthquake to hit the North Texas area was in 1997, when a 3.7-magnitude

earthquake rattled Greenville. That quake came almost two years after a May 31, 1995, tremor near Alpine, according to reports.

In 1985, a 3.3 magnitude earthquake hit about 50 miles north of the Dallas-Fort Worth area.

The most powerful earthquake ever recorded in Texas occurred in 1931 near Valentine and registered a 6.0 on the Richter scale. That quake destroyed a school and damaged chimneys, walls and frame structures, according to reports.

Two fault zones, the Mexia and Balcones, run parallel through Texas from Sherman past San Antonio, but they are inactive, scientists say.

Man arrested in fatal Airport Freeway wreck

BEDFORD — A 43-year-old North Richland Hills man was arrested Friday morning on suspicion that he caused an accident that left a pickup driver dead on Airport Freeway. Craig Skinner was in the Bedford Jail with bail set at \$50,000. Skinner, an information technology manager at a local company, was not injured in the accident, but he was taken to a local hospital, where police obtained a mandatory blood sample. He faces a charge of intoxication manslaughter, police said. Police identified the victim as Siao Si Henisolo, 53, of Euless. The westbound lanes of Airport Freeway between Industrial Boulevard in Euless and Forum Parkway in Bedford were closed for more than six hours Friday morning as authorities investigated the fatal wreck. The accident happened shortly before 5:15 a.m. Friday. According to preliminary police reports, a BMW was weaving in and out of traffic on westbound Airport Freeway when it hit the 1997 GMC pickup, causing the truck to leave the freeway and roll several times, police said.

City rule may hinder 'sober house'

Homes with a turnover of six people face restrictions.

EULESS — A new ordinance could make it more difficult for recovering drug addicts and alcoholics to live in "sober houses" in neighborhoods.

This year, some residents complained that a house in their neighborhood was being used by recovering alcoholics, creating safety concerns and potentially lowering property values.

"This ordinance provides definitions that address our changing society and the way single-family houses are being used today," City Manager Gary McKamie said.

The five-bedroom home on Oak Timber Drive, operated by California-based Primary Purpose, provides a substance-free living environment for men or women who have completed substance-abuse treatment programs.

The organization also has treatment houses in Grapevine and Lewisville, according to its Web site. Primary Purpose says that its residents can't have felonies, sexual offenses or violent crimes on their records and that they must stay employed.

The ordinance bars from residential areas transient houses that have a turnover of six or more people in 12 months. But because a person with a substance-abuse problem can sometimes be considered disabled, the ordinance also establishes a process for a disabled individual to petition the city for "reasonable ac-

commodation." Such an accommodation could include allowing a "sober house" in a residential area, city officials said.

By providing such a process, Euless is following federal guidelines under the Fair Housing Act and the Americans with Disabilities Act, said Mike Collins, the city's planning and development director.

"It's true we have a sober-living home in our community," Collins said. "It showed us that we didn't adequately address individual land uses in the city for people with disabilities."

Euless' city manager will consider all reasonable-accommodation petitions made to the city under the ordinance. His job will be to decide whether a reasonable accommodation is warranted and what it might be, McKamie said.

The office of Steven Polin, a Washington, D.C., attorney representing Primary Purpose Homes, requested in March that Euless provide "reasonable accommodations" for the Oak Timber house by considering it a single-family residence.

"The group behaves like a family and makes a group decision based on democratic procedures," Polin wrote to the city. "Primary Purpose Home is nothing more than a single-family residence."

He added that the house "is not a substance-abuse treatment facility, a halfway house, a shelter, a group home nor a residential care facility. There is no treatment, counseling, therapy or any type of health-care service provided."

On Thursday, Polin said the city's ordinance "makes some

fundamentally wrong assumptions about sober-living homes, and borders on discrimination."

"It is a step in the right direction in that the city has set up a process for reasonable accommodation requests," he said. But "this ordinance seems to assume that because sober homes are transient in nature they don't belong in single-family zones."

1 killed, 4 hurt in one-car accident on 360

EULESS — One man died and four others were injured in a one-car rollover accident on Texas 360 late Friday. Two people were ejected, police said. One of the men thrown from the car, Hai Ngo, 19, died from head injuries in the 1400 block of Texas 360 at about 6:55 p.m., according to the Tarrant County medical examiner's Web site. The other person thrown from the car was taken to John Peter Smith Hospital by helicopter ambulance, said Lt. John Williams, Euless police spokesman. Three other victims went to Parkland Memorial Hospital in Dallas, Williams said. The condition of the injured is unknown, police said. Witnesses told police that the driver was speeding when he lost control of his 2001 Chevrolet Cavalier, Williams said. — *Mitch Mitchell*

Tremors continue in Metroplex

Rare earth tremors continued in the Dallas-Fort Worth area Saturday, one day after several minor earthquakes made for a memorable Halloween for some North Texans. Two almost simultaneous earthquakes were detected in north Grand Prairie and north Irving just before 7 a.m. Saturday. The Grand Prairie quake measured a 2.5 magnitude, while the Irving quake was 2.7, according to the U.S. Geological Survey's Web site. Police dispatchers in Euless said they received 50 to 75 calls about the earthquakes. Most were from the northern end of town, said Lt. John Williams, Euless police spokesman. Like most other callers, those in Euless reported no injuries or damage.

Cities seek control over pipelines

The tiny town of Dish is lining up support for a campaign to give cities more control over natural gas pipeline routes.



Twenty-three towns and cities with a combined population of 850,000 have now joined the tiny Denton County town of Dish in a campaign for more control over natural gas pipelines.

Dish, formerly known as Clark, is at the intersection of several major pipelines. The town has so many pipelines converging on it that much of its land won't be developable. City leaders passed a resolution calling on the Legislature to give towns and cities more control over pipeline routes and have been campaigning for other cities to pass similar resolutions.

"I think it's huge," Dish Mayor Calvin Tillman said.

The Fort Worth City Council passed a version of the resolution Tuesday, and Tillman is working with the Texas Municipal League about lobbying the Legislature. That gives the movement strong support:

Fort Worth has an in-house lobbying staff and uses paid lobbyists; the Texas Municipal League has a history of legislative success in Austin.

The resolution addresses a key question that has arisen during the Barnett Shale gas boom. Pipeline companies can condemn private land to build natural gas gathering lines. As gas drilling has con-

tinued into heavily populated parts of Fort Worth, companies have condemned front yards and even a graveyard for right of way. Even in cases that don't wind up in condemnation, homeowners have said they feel pressured to settle rather than be taken to court.

Tillman said he has not seen any proposed bills dealing with pipelines.

The pipeline issue is not one of Fort Worth's top priorities, but "city staff will watch for the introduction of legislation and may well submit cor-

respondence in support of that legislation," said Reid Rector, the city's governmental relations director.

Other towns that have signed on, according to Tillman, are: Corinth, Granbury, Crowley, Mansfield, Bartonville, Little Elm, Cleburne, Lake Worth, Roanoke, Haslet, Justin, Southlake, Pilot Point, Northlake, Melissa, Kennedale, Euless, Springtown, Corral City, Argyle, Volente and Westlake.
