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Case of missing woman hits another roadblock

❶ A grand jury decided not to indict Daniel Glen Moore, a suspect in the apparent slaying of Kristen Charbonneau, whose body has never been found.

Eules police say they are again stymied in the case of Kristen Charbonneau, a 25-year-old exotic dancer who disappeared six years ago, after a Tarrant County grand jury declined to indict a man arrested in the case.

In February 2010, police arrested Daniel Glen Moore, 41, of Arlington, a patron of the strip club where Charbonneau worked. He was charged with murder after telling a friend he had accidentally killed Charbonneau, according to the arrest affidavit filed by police.

Police continued to investigate the case until December and presented evidence against Moore to a Tarrant County grand jury.

Eules police "had secured an arrest warrant and had done all the investigation they could," said Betty Arvin, the Tarrant County prosecutor who presented the case. "We presented that information to the grand jury, and they chose not to take action."

Eules police Capt. Gary Landers said he was disappointed by the grand jury's decision. But he said investigators were unable to corroborate the story told by Moore's friend.

"We're at a standstill right now," Landers said. "We've investigated it thoroughly, gone through it a number of times with numerous people to make sure no stone was left unturned. At this point, we have no new evidence to follow up on. Until new evidence surfaces or someone else comes forward, we've exhausted all the leads we have at this point."

Landers said Moore remains a suspect in the case. If new evidence is developed, it could be taken back to the grand jury.

Charbonneau is presumed dead, but her body has never been found. Moore did not elaborate in

what the police affidavit described as an emotional confession to his friend, nor did he say what became of Charbonneau's body.

Charbonneau was last seen on the afternoon of Aug. 11, 2005, after leaving Baby Dolls, a club in far east Fort Worth. Eules police investigated the disappearance because Charbonneau lived in that city at the time.

Witnesses told investigators that Moore walked Charbonneau to the door that day and left the club himself about the same time.

Until recently, Moore lived in southwest Arlington with his wife and children. He had been the target of a controversial campaign carried about by Charbonneau's parents, Monica and David Charbonneau of Irving, who created a website and sent hundreds of fliers to random addresses near Moore's home accusing him of killing Kristen Charbonneau.

Moore and Charbonneau's parents could not be reached for comment.
